CEC Grassland Management Soc. Sci. Summary and Needs Assessment

- 1) literature review of conservation social science related to Central Grassland landowner decision-making
- systematic and iterative Delphi process to gather information about conservation challenges, opportunities, and social science information needs of practitioners and prioritize these needs to guide future efforts.
- combined summary of pre-existing CEC funded surveys to understand the challenges and opportunities for conservation identified by rancher respondents in the U.S., Mexico, and Canada.
- 4) Plan that identifies:
 - opportunities and challenges for Central Grassland conservation delivery
 - gaps between applied social science needs as identified by practitioners and current knowledge
 - prioritization of needs for new social science inquiry and integration











Pressing concerns for the future of the central grasslands



Social issues which could improve outcomes for people; wildlife in grasslands - Pathways and AGC

- Advancing inclusion; equity; and diversity and equitable collaboration with marginalized and local communities and building authentic relationships
- Addressing inequitable distributions of risks and funding and addressing disparities
- Coordinating efforts across sectors and scales; addressing research-implementation gaps; and connecting issues and efforts
- Employing socioecological perspective that values all communities on the land
- Recognizing systems that contribute to perverse incentives and constrain conservation
- Increasing awareness about importance of grasslands

Perceptions of who is involved and who missing in "conservation" of grasslands in the Western paradigm

- Included: Eurocentric views; scientists; ranchers; landowners; wealthy people; white men; federal and state agencies; conservation groups; practitioners;
- Missing: underserved, people (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color; poor; immigrants); women; environmental justice communities, youth; rural and urban people; community leaders; conservation practitioners; ejidetarios
 - **Needs:** intentional and equitable engagement of underserved groups; changing top-down approach; changing current narrow reflection of diversity; all working together respectfully; grasslands influencers; making youth feel welcome; ways to prevent people being overwhelmed; materials in accessible formats



Ideas for strengthening connections and growing this network

- Community: establishing community of practice with conversations and webinars; resources for hiring personnel; wisdom & mutual care (recognizing common threats); structured collaboration across fields of study & conservation community; planning for integration/sharing with field staff; silo-busting + interdisciplinary approaches; strengthen conservation social networks to be more relevant (better outcomes for grasslands);
- Equity: equitable collaboration; support existing efforts; informing movement with
 community priorities; invitation not enough (space must be welcoming); subsidizing
 Indigenous languages; youth engagement; focus on wellbeing for all species &
 people; diversity of conservation approaches;



Ideas for strengthening connections and growing this network

- Economy: more tangible economic analysis/discussion; understanding costs to achieve conservation goals; more funding for Indigenous Nations and underserved people (restoration projects +); funding from carbon tax
- Communications: increased communication for coordination and collaboration; regular dialogue (online spaces; bridging gap of time); mutual check-in and sharing; more clear goals; expectations; creative use of all media to generate love for Indigenous science and grasslands

 Create diverse coalition across nations and sectors; improve equity of funding; set conservation priorities across landscape

GOALS

• Short term: equitably engage; identify diverse priorities and needs and current research

ROLES

 Build equitable conservation lens; summarize and coordinate social science efforts; address barriers to stewardship

PRIORITY ISSUES

 Equity; justice; invasive woody plant encroachment; habitat loss/degradation; impacts from drought and climate change; diversity; social science coordination; shared research priorities; social scientist support and communication; cultural; inclusive approaches; integration of disciplines
